Chairpersons Report Jeremy welcomed everyone to the meeting and introduced Terry (DC) and the committee.

His report was circulated prior to the start of the meeting and he explained the functions of the Executive committee and gave a brief resume of what the executive had achieved over the past year. He also highlighted occasions where the Group had supported the wider community.

Finances Eric circulated and explained the Group accounts and invited any questions on the Groups finances. He explained the need for compliance with OSCR requirements and explained that the accounts are available online on the Charities Commission web page.

He explained the benefits of Gift Aid and anticipates that the Group will have an annual income of £3000-£3500 from tax recovered which will be used for maintenance of the hall.

Presentation of Awards and Investments

Seven beavers were invested at the meeting and 4 Beavers were awarded their Bronze Chief Scout Awards and Dylan McMahon his gold Chief Scout award.

Steven Morton was presented with his 10-year service award and Iain Stevenson and Paula Stevenson were awarded their Wood badges.

There being no further business Jeremy closed the meeting and refreshments were served.

Chairman's Report for 2017 AGM

Executives function

- Maintenance of Groups property and its insurance.
- Raising funds and the administration of all finances.
- Supporting Group public occasions.
- Assisting with recruitment of leaders and other adult support.
- As a registered charity we are the Trustees and are responsible for complying with all legislation applicable to charities.

Brief summary of what the Executive have been doing over the past year.

- Maintain the Scout grounds, and building maintenance at a cost of £3,800
- Insurance reviewed to ensure both building and content are adequately insured.
- Funded both Hall and Camping equipment to £3,523
- The Group was successful in gaining an income of £1,810 from rental of the Hall for small functions and use by external groups. This is down 30% from 2015, the group has experienced issues with certain user paying on time, they are now no longer using our facilities. We now focus only on Scouting and Guiding maximising the availability of the Scout Hall for our own use.
- Replacement and renewal of Camping equipment for the use of the Group Sections which was an outlay of £3,523. This is a %160 increase on last year and was the result of section leaders retiring from leading sections and taking an active role as Quartermasters, going through all the inventory.
- Contracts for regular grounds maintenance
- Contract for internal cleaning of the Hall, which the Exec have maintained at an increased regularity of twice a week to reflect the increased usage our overall expenditure on cleaning was maintained at £1,740 reflecting the focus we put on keeping the hall clean and useable for all.
- Fully maintain the Minibus and any monies required are paid (£1,579) to keep the minibus useable by the sections when needed,

OSCR

Our submissions for year 2015-2016 were accepted by OSCR on first application.

Without retaining charitable status we cannot have a Gift Aid Scheme.

Can only obtain rates relief and bin collection if we maintain this status.

Gift Aid

Obtained £4,188 tax rebates for year 2015-2016. Currently 90% members out of 119 in scheme authorise the group to claim gift aid. This will give us an income of approx £3,500 - £4,000 in future years, the group have actively requested parents to join the scheme as tis is the single biggest income for the group. All money raised via tax rebate will be used for the maintenance of the property. It should be noted that the Gift Aid percentage rebate is being reduced in forthcoming years. To compensate we are allowed to claim rebates for 'bucket collections'

Membership

Membership of the Group has remained steady with approx 119 members on census at Jan 17. We have very strongly supported sections and 20 registered leaders.

The Executive do monitor on a monthly basis to verify subscriptions owed to the group are being paid, anyone falling into arrears are

contacted, to remedy the shortfall. With the ultimate sanction removal from the group if we are unable to secure payment

Public occasions

- Provided support to Community events Relay for Life.
- Donated the use of the Hall and Minibus to Chernobyl Children Lifeline Charity in the summer. We feel this is a very deserving charity and waive charges for the use of our hall or Minibus. This is again planned for the Summer of 2017.

Hall also being used by other Groups, Woodlands Trust, Brownies, District Scouting events, plus some small functions primarily by users linked to the group.

August - October 2016 Term

Donibristle Scouts Annual Report

I can't believe it's that time again... this year has been so jam packed with activities we almost lost track.

Things got off to a cracking start in July 2016 when we took 6 Scouts down to Essex – where they met 8000 other Scouts for a week long, International Jamboree – the largest in Europe last year. They had an amazing week and if you don't believe me... the pictures are on the wall in the Scout Hall to prove it! The Scouts made lots of new friends and got an invite to the Northern Ireland Jamboree so that's our summer camp for 2017.

In August, we had a first go at orienteering at Lochore Meadows after enjoying a hammock camp at Nine Acres in the Crook of Devon.

In September, we participated in the first ever annual Challenge Walk. One Scout (Ben Dykes) was determined enough to gain a platinum badge for the full 18 mile walk and we had some very respectable golds, silver and bronzes for 9, 6 and 4 miles respectively. We also had a Tepee Camp at Bonaly- where we focused on pioneering and Knots – the warden said our 'sofa and table' were the best she'd ever seen!

We did caving and wood carving up at Fordell for our October Zodiac camp and went to the Jock Neish Centre near Dundee for the first time, in November. It was definitely a winter camp with ice on the ground in the mornings. We also put in a team for the annual Woolmer Trophy - a test of scouting skills... and took home the cup!

In December we had a first go at fund raising for Summer Camp 2017 and the Christmas hamper raised £560 and a bag-packing session raised a further £360. Many thanks to all Scouts and parents who contributed. We also had a fascinating trip to the RNLi station in Kinghorn. Our Christmas craft camp was followed by a couple of rounds of crazy golf.

In the New Year we went to a new location... Wemyss Firs near Kirkcaldy, an excellent small campsite and we did a hike from West Wemyss down to Ravenscraig Park. In February, we had a joint Chefs camp with St Davids Scouts. All enjoyed coming up with their own menus, shopping for ingredients and then cooking breakfast, lunch and dinner, with in the main, delicious results.

In March, some of the scouts took part in a Water Activities camp and put the knowledge they earned to good effect when they participated in the Water Safety Competition. Two of our scouts joined up with two scouts from the 77th Aberdour to win the competition and another team of our scouts came a in second place. We also started on the meteorologist badge with the scouts making their own mini weather stations to take readings.

In April, we all enjoyed the District Camp and the scouts cooked up a storm with their Mongolian dishes for the International Buffet. We were also proud to see one of our Scouts – Andrew Thompson - given the first Gold Zodiac Award. That means he has, whilst meeting a number of other challenges, participated in at least one nights

camp every month for 27 months. That is an amazing achievement, but one which we expect many more of our scouts to attain over the coming months.

In May, we went orienteering at Bonaly and Clay Pigeon Shooting with the BASC...think we have started a trend as some of the other scout groups now want to take a shot at it... no pun intended!

We also entered a team in the District Totem camping competition. All the months hard work at Zodiac camps paid off and our team were the winners.... And will now represent the District at the Zonal qualifiers later this month... so well done to them and good luck!

And good luck too to our two Scouts who have now left the Troop, Dylan McMahan and Kieran Nichol who both achieved their Chief Scout Gold Awards in the last year.

So all in all it has been a really productive and enjoyable year for Scouts and Leaders alike. And in that respect I have to say that none of this would have been possible without my fellow scout leaders Gordon, Murray, Paula and a new recruit Tony. So thanks all, I truly couldn't have done it without you.

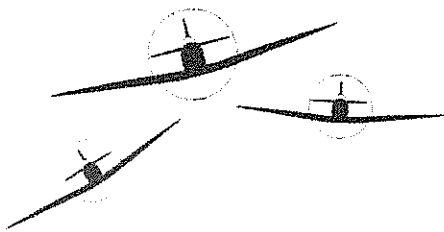
Coming into the breach are Keith Wood (Scout Leader), Iain Miller (Assistant Scout Leader),

It's been a busy and changing year for the Explorers. The biggest change for us is our name and branding, yes after a number of years we finally have a name – Merlin Explorers has been chosen by the members themselves, they chose the name after learning all about the HMS Merlin based here in Dalgety Bay during the war.

Over that past year the Explorers has also gone through structural changes, establishing a two strong patrol system and an Explorer lead council – who have undertaken training to strengthen their role.
